<p><b>2.1 Industry Clusters/Health Care Initiative</b></p> <p>Continues funding of a Health Care Initiative that provides clients with the skills and placement needed to enter and advance within the health care industry.</p> <p>The progression of career advancement opportunities available to clients, listed in order, is as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ In Home Support Services (IHSS);</li> <li>▪ Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA);</li> <li>▪ Licensed Vocational Nurse (LVN);</li> <li>▪ Registered Nurse (RN).</li> </ul>	\$1,000,000	\$1,000,000	<p>The Metropolitan Alliance, through SCOPE, a partner agency, has assisted the Healthcare project in securing an additional \$180,000 commitment over the next three years (\$60,000 per annum) to provide healthcare training and job placement programs to residents in East and South Los Angeles. <p><b>2.2 Technology Academy and Training Services</b></p> <p>Provides job seekers with up-to-date skills, as needed to Reduce technology based skills deficiencies.</p> <p>Continue funding New Media University Academy (NMUA), through USC Neighborhood Outreach (UNO), to serve as the sub-contractor to provide technology-training services. Contractor has been funded on a sole source basis based on their unique relationship with the University of Southern California that provides an on-campus experience for youth.</p>	\$100,000	\$100,000	<p>As of March 31, 2005, a total of 25 youth have received program services.</p>
